In advance of the 2020-2021 semester, I redesigned the course to include two additional weeks on the politics of counterterrorism in China and South Asia. Student comments included "Alex was a fantastic lecturer who provided relevant information in a welcoming environment;" "Alex was engaging, keen and readily available when students needed him;" "Alex was a great teacher and this was by far my favourite module;" "used feedback from the class to alter teaching/seminar styles for what worked and did not work for our particular group;" "Both lectures and seminars were top notch. The material indicated for reading by Dr Waterman was complete and instructive;" "Dr Waterman's Terrorism module is ran incredibly efficient. His lectures are incredibly informative and the way in which he explains theory is engaging to all and easily digestible, which is very impressive with such a nuanced topic."

## Insurgency (2016-2020), POLIS, University of Leeds

- Delivered a series of guest lectures introducing insurgent groups from my own research and reflecting on the theories for understanding their evolution covered in the module. During the module's transition from a five-week to an eleven-week course, I played a key role in developing new content, weekly questions and reading materials, the assessment format and essay questions in

collaboration with the module leader, integrating themes emerging from our own research (including a session on rebel governance and another on internal insurgent politics).

## Peacekeeping and Peacebuilding (2023-2024), PSID, University of Bradford

- Delivered a series of lectures on contemporary post-conflict security challenges and the processes of elite bargaining in postwar contexts

## Environment, Trafficking and Crime (2023-2024), PSID, University of Bradford

 Delivered a series of lectures on global governance structures and regimes' effectiveness in regulating transnational "bads" such as small arms and landmines.

#### International System in Theory and Context (2023-2024), PSID, University of Bradford

 Co-managed this module introducing advanced concepts in international relations theory, spanning international law/norms through to terrorism and security studies theories.

## India Since 1947: Community, Caste and Political Violence, School of History, University of Leeds

Delivered a guest lecture on political violence in Northeast India.

## Conflict Resolution (2016), Tata University of Social Sciences, Guwahati, Assam, Convener

Designed and implemented a short series of lectures, seminars and preparatory material within the university's Peace and Conflict Studies MA programme. I focused on the relationship between conflict, security and development, allowing for engagement with the theoretical literature on order, conflict and security, revisiting my own interpretations of key concepts through interaction with students and demonstrating research-led design and practice in teaching in a different country context. Faculty members noted that students asked if it was possible that I remain in Guwahati to lead more sessions.

#### **Undergraduate Level Three**

## Advanced Study of International Relations (2023-24), PSID, University of Bradford

- I co-taught this module, introducing a range of active and problem-based learning initiatives to connect live and ongoing international situations (i.e. Ukraine, Gaza) with theories and debates in the literature on international relations.

## Terrorism: Concepts, Debates, Cases (2016-2020), POLIS, University of Leeds

- I delivered two seminar groups on the module (2018-2019), which introduces students to the key debates in the terrorism literature, using a range of delivery techniques including semi-structured and unstructured debates, "human continuum" debates and small group case study work. I delivered a research-led guest lecture on religious terrorism in Punjab, India (2016-2017). I have also contributed to assessment question design, drawing on my own engagement with the terrorism literature and theories of teaching and learning, and module review processes during 2018-2019.
- During online delivery in 2020-2021, I adapted several of the above techniques (for example converting 'human continuum debates'
  into Likert-scale polling followed by discussions of the results) and introduced a weekly "terrorism in the news" segment intended to
  link theory to ongoing situations in conflict and political violence.
- Following online delivery in 2020-2021, students commented: "Gordon and Alex have both been excellent and this has by far been my favourite module during my time at university!!" "The seminar tutor Alex was really amazing, explained everything in detail and we could ask anything even if he talked about it already;" "I also liked that we took the time to discuss Terrorism in the news in Alex Waterman's seminars;" "the weekly emails Alex sent us were so useful as he shared additional resources which I found very useful;" "Keep 'terrorism in the news' please, it is one of the great things about the module."

## Dissertation Supervisor (2019-2020), POLIS, University of Leeds

- Supervised 15 students to completion on projects related to international security, conflict, intervention and South Asia, switching supervisions to online delivery during the COVID-19 pandemic, and moderated a number of other dissertations. Students commented that "I always felt like there was support on hand (even in pandemic times), which is really appreciated;" "I truly feel lucky to have been able to work with a supervisor who was continuously proactive in supporting us especially during such odd times;" "Supervisor (Alex Waterman) was excellent and always willing to give feedback and advice." I have also worked with strong candidates working their dissertations up for submission to top undergraduate journals, including the West Point Journal of Politics and Security.

## Dissertation Sub-Supervision (2018), POLIS, University of Leeds

I worked with a member of staff to trial a novel method of postgraduate training in supervising dissertation students. This involved reading drafts and offering comments on an undergraduate dissertation project while closely coordinating with the lead project supervisor, who led discussions in meetings while building in opportunities for me to offer additional comments and support. A reflective account of this process is being developed into a pedagogical article and a model for doctoral student training.

#### **Undergraduate Level Two**

## Contemporary Conflict Analysis (2023-24), Department of Peace Studies and International Development, University of Bradford

- Co-convened this module through a series of team-based workshops in which students "learn by doing," in this case using conflict analysis tools from the field and applying them to various country contexts in order to develop students' ability to critically reflect on the value of various policy and academic approaches to conflict analysis.

#### The Politics and Processes of Foreign Policy (2023-24), PSID, University of Bradford

- Ran a series of interactive sessions on the evolution of diplomacy since the end of World War I, with specific activities and debates analysing the relationship between public opinion and diplomatic practice.

## Contemporary International Relations (2023-24), PSID, University of Bradford

 Designed and delivered content on key thematic areas in contemporary international relations. Sessions were designed to encourage students to use theoretical perspectives to reflect on ongoing crises (i.e. Gaza/Ukraine), allowing students to connect to and use their pre-existing knowledge. This was reflected in my design of the summative assessment in which we asked students to reflect on these crises using theoretical tools discussed during the module.

## The European Union (2019), School of Arts and Communication, Leeds Trinity University

- As a Visiting Lecturer, I managed and delivered this module on the politics of the European Union, designing lecture and seminar content in which students were encouraged to critically reflect, using theoretical perspectives, on contemporary political developments, in doing so allowing students to connect to and utilise pre-existing knowledge. I delivered an innovative assessment in which students designed their own essay questions, while working closely with students and moderation teams to ensure that content and assessment remained aligned.

## Security Studies (2016-2018), POLIS, University of Leeds

In this popular level two module, I designed and delivered a range of activities to contribute to broader module objectives. In line with Ambrose's (2010) recognition that students learn by building on prior knowledge, I provided opportunities for students to assess and reflect upon their existing knowledge by designing a theory-definition matching exercise. Other innovative activities included the 'human continuum' approach to debating, in which students physically move to a point along a continuum in relation to a debate question before articulating points. This encouraged discussion between students and was well-received in mid-term and final module evaluation forms.

## **Undergraduate Level One**

#### IY1 Freedom, Power and Resistance (2019), Leeds International Study Centre, Module Leader

I managed and convened this introductory module to political theory, designing lecture, seminar and assessment materials and delivering them across two cohorts of international students on the International Year One Programme, which prepares students for entry into POLIS level two International Relations programmes. The design process was informed by Biggs and Tang's (2011) notion of "constructive alignment," as well as theories of active and problem-based learning. In one particular activity, Thomas Hobbes' idea of the "war of all against all" was introduced through a prisoner's dilemma role-playing game framed using the popular culture film "Mad Max," inspired by other attempts to introduce theories and concepts in political science (Blanton, 2013).

## Understanding the International System (2023-24), PSID, University of Bradford

- I designed lecture, seminar and assessment materials and delivered them to a large cohort of predominantly international students. The design process was informed by Biggs and Tang's (2011) notion of "constructive alignment," as well as theories of active and problem-based learning. I also took important steps to expand the module's focus into critical Global South regions such as South

## Making of the Modern World (2015-2021), POLIS, University of Leeds

- On this historically-oriented module, I designed and delivered a range of innovative teaching sessions to align with existing course objectives, including primary source analysis exercises and role-playing debate activities. From October 2018, I delivered guest lectures on colonialism in Northeast India, integrating insights from my field research, and in 2021 ran and delivered "week 4: India" in its entirety.
- Following changes in the module leadership during the second year of delivery (2017 2018), I worked closely with the new module leader to redesign significant aspects of the module's content. This included readings, activities and the module's formative and summative assessment questions, a process which I approached through my understanding of Biggs and Tang's (2011) notion of constructive alignment in ensuring that these all aligned to fulfil the module's wider learning objectives.
- I received excellent feedback across all three years of delivery. Seminar group-specific student evaluations for example scored an average of 4.9/5 in agreement with the statement that "I am satisfied with the individual quality of seminars on this module" (2017 2018). I also received the following comments: "love my seminar tutor, he's great, really interactive and allows for debate in class;" "seminars with Alex are really good;" "Alex Waterman really supportive and enthusiastic made it so much fun;" "Alex is a good tutor;" (2015 2016); "seminars have been really interesting and good environment for debate and asking questions;" "Seminars were very engaging and helped increase quality & level of knowledge, as everyone engaged and was led very well" (2017 2018).

## Global Development Challenges (2017-2019), POLIS, University of Leeds

 This module surveys a range of contemporary development issues, including conflict, hunger, migration and the environment, exploring causes, impacts and responses. A particularly innovative learning activity delivered during the module is an adaptation of the "River Basin Game," a practitioner role-playing exercise intended to highlight the complexities of water resource allocation to realworld stakeholders. I designed paper-based resources, tweaked elements of the rules and changed the number of actors to make this activity accessible to a one-hour, level one undergraduate seminar, reflecting on the activity to make improvements over two years of delivery. Placing students in the role of stakeholders and chairs generated a sense of active participation in and ownership over learning consistent with Problem-Based Learning Theories. I have also drawn upon aspects of blended learning to enhance participation and shape assessment guidance activities according to student needs. This, along with other activities has been well-received by students, who have commented particularly on the engaging and inclusive nature of seminars (see below).

- I received excellent feedback overall. Comments included: "Alex is a great teacher. He is knowledgeable and easy to understand. He works very hard to make sure that all students are comfortable with the subject and understand everything. He is easy to approach regarding topics and always has time for students;" "My tutor Alex was incredibly enthusiastic and gave me brilliant guidance;" "Alex Waterman led my seminar for this module and was extremely helpful and made me enjoy this module even more, he gave great support and good feedback;" "Alex was very helpful in clarifying any problems in seminars as well as starting and continuing debate which involved everyone and went into more depth than was suggested in the handbook"

## International Politics (2017-2018), POLIS, University of Leeds

- This course offers an introduction to theoretical approaches to understanding International Relations before focusing primarily on key themes within the discipline, such as War and Terrorism, and case study regions such as Asia and the Middle East. I designed and implemented a range of learning activities, including a role-playing exercise designed in conjunction with other TAs and based on a popular board game, to illustrate to students the challenges of international environmental cooperation. The exercise was underpinned by a desire to make accessible the theoretical insights of the cooperation literature in International Relations theory, while drawing upon Problem-Based Learning literature to facilitate student ownership over learning processes.
- My teaching received overwhelmingly positive feedback, particularly on the conducive learning environment that seminars provided as well as teaching staff enthusiasm. A selection of comments include: "Great seminars/teaching;" "Teaching was really enthusiastic;" "for me the best aspects were the seminars. I felt they were really engaging and that I could ask any question I wanted." I also received a follow-up email from a student following completion of the module: "As a student from another country studying a non-POLIS subject, I found the module profoundly interesting and very impressive. The seminars with you, in particular, were inspiring and thought-provocative. You were good at kindling debates and encouraging new ideas, and seminars with you are definitely one of my favorite experiences at Leeds! I think I must say to you a big thank you."
